About MEET MISS FANCY

A charming and significant story set prior to the Civil Rights Movement about a boy who finds a way to challenge segregation laws. Inspired by actual events.

Frank has always been obsessed with elephants. He loves their hosepipe trunks, tree stump feet, and swish-swish tails. So when Miss Fancy, the elephant, retires from the circus in 1913 and moves two blocks from his house to Avondale Park (Birmingham, Alabama), he's over the moon! Frank really wants to pet her. But Avondale Park is just for white people, so Frank is not allowed to see Miss Fancy. Frank is heartbroken but he doesn't give up: instead he makes a plan!

More About the Book:

This is my 8th book for children, and it brought me back to Excellent Editor Stacey Barney (G.P. Putnam's Sons/Penguin Random House), who helped me bring forth my debut historical fiction middle grade novel LEAVING GEE'S BEND in 2010. What joy to work with Stacey again!

I first learned about Miss Fancy from an article by James L. Baggett in *Alabama Heritage* magazine. I wrote SO MANY drafts of this book! But every time I sent them to my amazing agent Rosemary Stimola, she said, "not there yet." I almost gave up. And then I found it: my story. It came from a snippet of research about Birmingham's 16th Street Baptist Church's 1913 petition for the congregation to have a picnic in the park with Miss Fancy. That's when the muses offered me Frank. Big thanks to my friend Pat who kept asking, "how's that Miss Fancy story coming along?" Even a nudge as small as that can help keep a writer going!

This is not the first time my books have featured an elephant. Both DON'T FEED THE BOY and DEAR WANDERING WILDEBEEST include elephants. That may be because one of my most beloved books as a child was HORTON HATCHES THE EGG by Dr. Seuss. Plus my poem "Let's Celebrate the Elephant" appears in THE POETRY FRIDAY ANTHOLOGY FOR CELEBRATIONS.

My favorite spread in MEET MISS FANCY features Frank's mother imparting some important words to Frank. These were the toughest words to get right in the whole manuscript! Just like Frank's mother, I believe change can and will happen; it just takes hope, determination, imagination, love and *time*.


